## A. Eco Videos

Curated by Kohen McBride, Cinema Studies Major, University of Toronto

Artists' videos incorporate animation, stop-motion and experimental film techniques to address environmental issues.

## B. The Clubhouse

Design Team: Discovery Channel's *Junk Raiders 2* team

A freestanding two-story clubhouse built from trash found on the streets of Toronto. The creation of this building was part of Season 2 of the Discovery Channel's *Junk Raiders*, a reality TV show focused on the idea of "upcycling" to the limits of imagination.

## C. Dan Bergeron (a.k.a. fauxreel)

Large photos portray people who worked on this site.

### Toronto, Brick by Brick (C1)

Six large-scale portraits of former employees of the brickmaking plant.

### Transformation Crew (C2)

A group portrait of members of the Eastern Construction crew who helped to transform Evergreen Brick Works.

## D. Heritage on Site

Archival photographs

Nine archival photographs illustrate how brickmaking at this site contributed to the building of Toronto, and how geological layers exposed in the quarry revealed glacial deposits over the past 400 million years.

## E. Full Circle

Artist: Amelia Jiménez

A kinetic sculpture that resonates with the evolving layers of deposits on the North Slope.

## F. Ferruccio Sardella

Sardella's works embed an artistic sensibility within the program and site identity.

### Watershed Wall (F1)

The sculpture reveals Toronto's ravine system as a living presence that shapes the city's physical and cultural identity.

### Native Tenants (F2, F3)

The large-scale sculptural representations of local plants are poetic emblems of the transformed brick factory. F2. Black Eyed Susan (*Rudbeckia hirta*)  
F3. Purple Coneflower (*Echinacea purpurea*)

## G. Legacy (the mud beneath our feet)

Artist: David Hind

A tribute to A.P. Coleman, who found evidence of ancient periods of climate change in the layers of deposits on the North Slope of the quarry. Hind's work interacts with natural spaces as the art grows with the plant material around them.

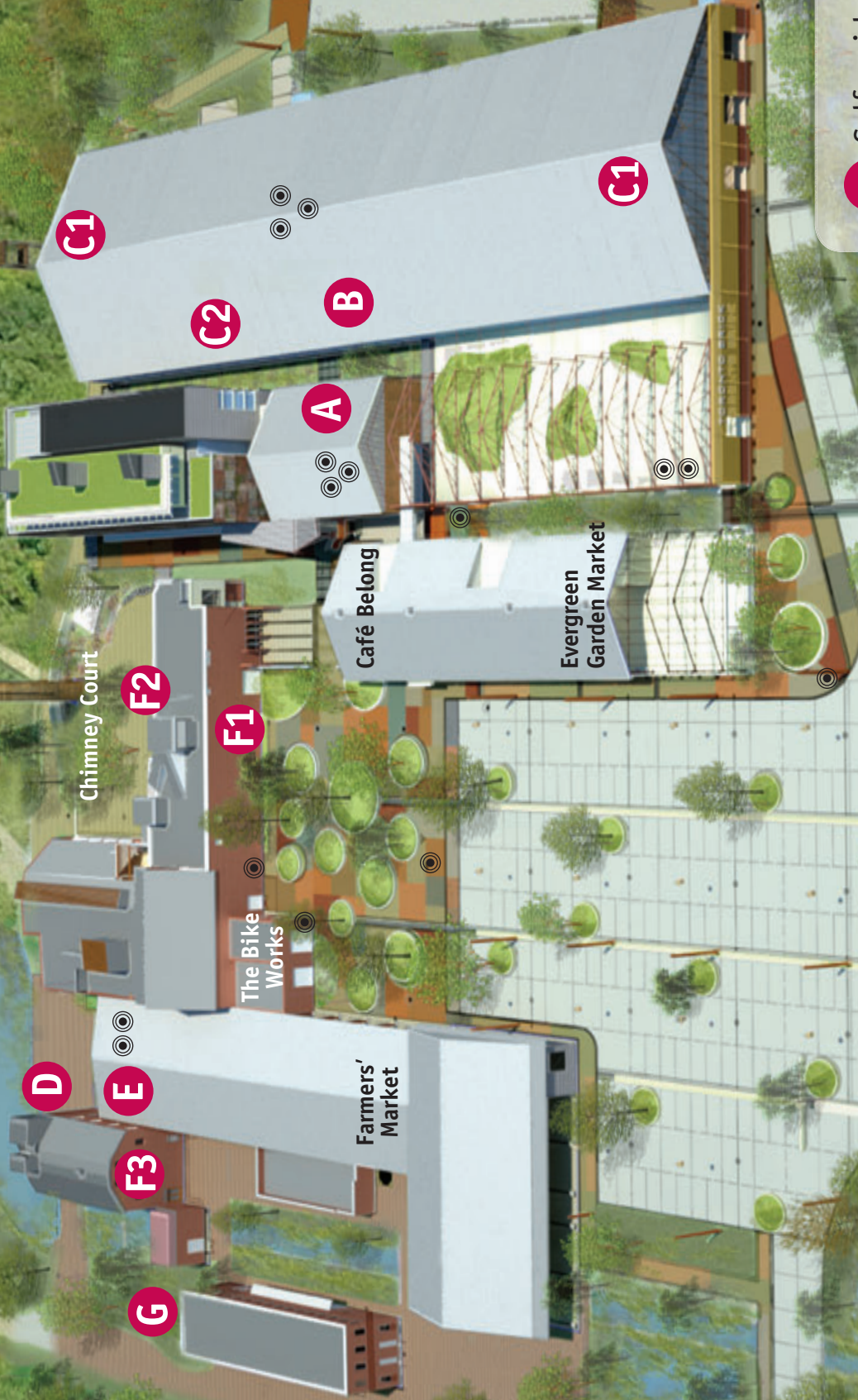
